

Her doctoral research in Religious Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara, focused on Hindu traditions in India and America. For twenty years she taught world religions at UNC Charlotte, UC Riverside, American Jewish University, and Davidson College. As a Club Z Educator, she teaches 8th-12th graders about Jewish history, Israel, and activism. As Founder of Sanskrit Revolution, she teaches the language and history of yoga at certification programs nationwide. Along with Dr. Brandy Shufutinsky, she will be launching a new podcast, In Doctrine Nation: Examining Radicalized Education.

# Common Q&A's

#### What is similar and different about these ethno-religions?

Both are indigenous to a homeland. Jews are from Judea, and Hindus are from Bharata. However, they differ in that Jews live in diaspora initially by force and then by choice, whereas Hindus live in diaspora by choice.

#### What is similar about Judaism and Hinduism?

Both are "orthoprax" religions that emphasize "practice" as opposed to being "orthodox" with focus on belief in a creed such as faith-based religions like Christianity and Islam.

### What similar social issues have these communities faced as minority groups in the US?

Misrepresentation in school textbooks and curriculum that compromises their sense of inclusion in our pluralistic society.

## **Key Takeaways**

- Hinduism and Judaism are frequently misunderstood and therefore people might not notice and speak up to oppose "anti-semitism" and "Hinduphobia."
- Jews are indigenous to Judea (i.e. 1948, Israel) and Hindus are indigenous to Bharata (i.e. 1947, India). Both are communities living in diaspora whose experiences can inform one another.
- Hindus and Jews are allies who should advocate for each other: attend community events, join rallies, and speak at school board meetings.
